Chapter News

Crozet Quilters – Mary Creed-Pallone – At Crozet meetings we now sit in a large circle which has really increased discussion. We recently started a group activity which consists of one member asking a question such as "when did you first start sewing on a machine and what did you make?" and each of us responding in turn. We are continuing with our monthly "teachable moments" with our most recent being on how to write or draw on a quilt. We will continue with a monthly "meet the quilter", but we will start with some older members so our new quilting friends can get to know us all. We are busy gathering our Raffle Basket items for the Quilt Show. The theme of our basket is "Coffee, Tea or ME".

We have started planning for Spring Fest, which we will be hosting at the Crozet United Methodist Church on May 4 (see page 6 for details). Our speaker will be Sheryl Sims, an art quilter from Northern Virginia. Our pillowcase challenge is planned for Monday, June 24 and all Guild members are encouraged to participate. We have started working on blocks for this year's Honor Quilt. A road trip to the VQM is planned for this summer. Finally, Crozet is planning to have a retreat September 16-17 when we will meet at the church for two consecutive days to sew on individual projects and or group projects.

Moonlighters' members are working on a quilt to donate later this year to the Center as a thank you for the meeting space. In addition to Meals on Wheels and Bright Stars quilts, Fidget Quilts for donation to local nursing homes are collected. This project is coordinated by Melinda Smith.

Nelson Quilters – Barbara Tinsley – January's wintery weather caused the Nelson Quilters to miss our two January meetings. Nevertheless, the newly elected officers were able to gather at Debbie Truett Speilman's home for a delicious lunch and a planning session.

Two projects coming up for the first half of the year are the annual raffle quilt for the Piney River Fire Department and the Quilt of Honor which we present to a local veteran at the Memorial Day ceremonies in Nelson County. Chairs were named for both of these projects and plans are well underway.

Block kit packets for the Quilt of Honor were distributed at our first meeting in February and plans have been made to put the blocks together at a sew-in at the Tuckahoe Clubhouse in March.

A design was approved, and fabrics were chosen for the Piney River quilt at our first March meeting. Members brought in green fabrics to use in the quilt and block kit packets will be distributed at our next meeting.

At our first meeting each month we will continue the practice of gathering one hour before our meeting time for a Brown Bag Supper. We find this a wonderful, relaxed time to get to know one another, ask questions, learn from each other and about each other.

Grateful Threads – *Karen Burnette* – The number of members coming to Monday meetings is such that we have "back rows". In order to assist members with soft voices, members with hearing issues, and just the amount of fabric in the room absorbing sound, we are all getting use to using the wireless microphone. Robin Hamill-Ruth is organizing a monthly sew-in at the fire and rescue station on McIntire so members can work on rescue squad blankets, Bright Star quilts, etc. Linda Boone did a presentation on rulers and cutting mats. Our Block exchange is being organized. Member Shelby Cosgrove has moved to Chattanooga, Tenn.

CAQG Board Meeting Behind the Scenes

*As you may know, the Board of the Guild met in early March as the first quarterly meeting of the year. While your Chapter Rep will likely tell you what was discussed and approved, I thought you might want to read about some highlights, especially if you don't belong to a Chapter.

*In December, the Board approved a document to supplement and clarify the new By-Laws titled, **Standard Rules and Procedures** or SRPs. At this meeting we updated it slightly to provide greater clarity to our work. The document can be found on our website (<u>www.caqg.weebly.com</u>) under FAQs. The document gives guidance on fiscal matters, board roles, and policies that guide programs, community service, the quilt show, and retreats among other things. Have questions about what you read? Please reach out to a Board member.

*You may have heard that we were recently approved as a 501(c)3 tax exempt organization by the IRS. Karen Poos, our treasurer, has been diligently crossing t's and dotting i's on what that means for us. To begin with, **charitable donations** to the Guild are now eligible for documentation to use when itemizing deductions on your personal taxes (these are NOT needed if you take a standard deduction). The Guild will issue a letter for monetary donations over \$20. A form is also available for non-monetary donations used expressly for the Guild's charity projects (quilts, books, fabrics, etc.). Check with a Board member if you have questions. Karen is also working with the state to establish our ability to purchase Guild items without paying sales tax. While this option won't be available to individual members to purchase materials for donated items (our tax exemptions are covered with the documents noted above), it will save the Guild some money on items purchased for the quilt show, fests, and supplies for charity such as labels, batting and books. Stay tuned for more information as we await this approval.

*Our Community Services Coordinator, Robin Hamill-Ruth, has been working to expand who we can serve and who will help us with those projects. With this expansion has come a recognition that we could not begin to meet our goals if **professional longarmers** didn't contribute their services to the extent that they do. In the past we have arbitrarily gifted some with stipends, but we want to be more transparent, equitable, and meet the expectations of our 501(c)3 status. The Board has approved a policy of allowing our members who are professional longarmers to submit company invoices to the Guild for \$10 per quilt for charity items quilted without charge to our members. While the amount does not begin to equal what they would normally charge for such work, it does allow them to recoup some funds for at least their cost of thread. The details of the policy can be found in the SRP document on the website.

*As always, members are welcome to attend any Board meeting (contact either the President or Secretary for correct time and location or Zoom invitation).

CAQG Quilt Show 2024 Final Update/Reminders

Wow! I can't believe the quilt show is almost here! In less than a month we will welcome visitors to see over 190 quilts, purchase handmade items, and listen and learn from our demos. We couldn't do it, of course, without your generous gift of volunteering at the show. If you are new to our guild, we encourage you to sign up even if you aren't sure what you'll be doing (<u>https://www.signupgenius.com/go/805084EAEA72DABFA7-48270241-quilt</u>). Nothing is difficult and many of our members are experienced and can guild you. Even if you can't volunteer, please visit the show and patronize our vendors or buy something at the Boutique (<\$25 per item) or Shoppe at the Show.

On Friday, April 12th we will drop off our quilts at the Center at Belvedere and erect stands, hang quilts, post signs, and prepare for what we hope will be 500+ visitors to the show over the weekend. Quilts will be dropped off between 2:00 and 3:00 PM. We'll send out reminders the week before so you can make plans with a friend if you can't make that time window. We open the doors on Saturday, April 13th, at 9:00 am and close at 4:00 pm. During that time, volunteers will collect entrance fees, distribute ballots, sell raffle tickets, present demos, and float around answering questions and showing the backs of quilts when asked. Wear your name tag, showing you are a proud guild member! We do it again on Sunday, April 14th, from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm. At that time, we close the auditorium to everyone except those helping take the show down. **Quilts can be picked up no sooner than 4:15 pm** (assuming we have everything loaded in the truck by then).

There is still time to contribute items to either the **Boutique** (less than \$25 apiece) or the **Shoppe at the Show** (\$25 and above), but please don't wait until the last minute as Alicia and Valerie have to price everything in advance. If you can't make your chapter meeting, please reach out to a friend to bring your donations.

If you have **raffle quilt tickets** you won't be able to sell, please be sure to return them ASAP (at the show at the latest) so that someone else can sell them. We've had to order more already, so they are going like hotcakes! Remember when you do sell them to put your name on the back to become eligible to win a prize.

Look for the list of demos posted on our website (<u>Quilt Show - Charlottesville Area Quilters Guild</u> (<u>weebly.com</u>)) so you can plan your visit accordingly. Be sure to patronize our food vendors, Greenberry's and Ott Street Eats food truck (<u>Ott Street Eats | food truck | 304 South Main Street</u>, <u>Harrisonburg</u>, VA, USA.

Pillowcases Sew-In Crozet Chapter

SAVE THE DATE!

The Crozet Chapter will be hosting the Pillowcase Challenge this year on Monday, June 24, at Tabor Presbyterian Church. There will be two sessions, 10:00 am to noon and 12:30 pm to 3:00 pm. All are invited to join us in Crozet or make pillowcases at home to contribute to Shelter for Help in Emergency (SHE). SHE gives safe shelter to victims of domestic abuse.

Moonlighters All Star Challenge

All CAQG members are invited to participate in the "All Stars" challenge for 2024 Fall Fest, hosted by Moonlighters. Date, time, and place of Fall Fest TBA.

Here are the rules and requirements:

All Star challenge quilts should have stars as an identifiable design element.

Techniques can include piecing, appliqué, painting, embellishment, and others; and/or the challenge can be met using a fabric printed with stars.

All Star challenge quilts do not have to contain 100% stars, but stars should be readily noticeable.

Stars can be any shape that the viewer can recognize as a star.

The term "star" should be taken literally, not metaphorically. (For example, my dog is a "star" to me, but a portrait of my dog does not work...unless he's wearing stars).

Size requirements: No single side should be smaller than 12" and no single side should be larger than 24".

The challenge is for quilts, not bags, boxes, dolls, clothing, and other fun items.

Display requirements: our volunteers will hang the quilts temporarily by pinning pieces of Velcro to the back of the quilts. Consider display requirements when choosing the shape, weight, and finishing techniques. A sleeve and label are not required.

Delivery of quilts for display: Makers are responsible for bringing their quilts and taking them home that day or for enlisting a friend to assist them.

Other rules: There are no other rules. This is intended as fun project that gives us all something to look at and talk about at Fall Fest. We hope you join us in the challenge, and we look forward to seeing all the stars at Fall Fest 2024.



Community Projects

Bright Star Quilts

Quilting tutorial with Chandra and Janet at CARS on McIntire. Had 27 participants. Many Bright Star tops had been made by the women in the sewing group at Westminster Canterbury from sets of 10.5" squares. Robin added backing, binding and batting to make kits. Janet talked about spray fusing and she and Chandra reviewed their approach to simple quilting patterns. The group then quilted over 40 Bright Star quilts.

It was such a success that we plan to have a repeat in either late April or during May. Save your tops, make your own kits and join us. You can also attack your stash and donate 10.5" squares for WCBR sewers. 2 sets of 10 are easiest but any combo of different squares works. Robin can collect squares and deliver them to WCBR. Thanks to all who donated and participated.

Blankets for Homeless

We had 2 sew-ins to construct fleece blankets for the fire and rescue squad to distribute to the homeless in Charlottesville. To date, we've made over 150 fleece blankets. Some of those are 2-layered fleece with texture patches, most are one fleece layer backed with a waterproof synthetic fabric. These waterproof blankets have been included in the department's cold weather packs (with socks, gloves, hat, hand warmers etc.).These have been given to stressed and house insecure individuals over the past few months.
